



Instructions for Authors

Scope

As the first international journal entirely devoted to philosophical skepticism, the *International Journal for the Study of Skepticism* (*SKEP*) publishes high-quality articles and discussion notes on any field of research relevant to the study of skeptical thought. The journal also contains critical notices and reviews of major books on skepticism, and organizes book symposia on recent ground-breaking works. On occasion, it publishes special issues devoted to current lively debates on specific topics or authors. The wide range of areas covered includes the history and significance of ancient, medieval, modern, and contemporary skepticism as well as discussions of current specific skeptical problems and arguments in epistemology, metaethics, ontology, philosophy of religion, philosophy of mind, and philosophy of language. The Journal is fully committed to the highest standards of clarity and rigor, and serves as a forum for debate and exchange of ideas among leading international philosophers and scholars. It solicits contributions from contemporary philosophers working in a variety of methods and traditions, including both analytic and continental philosophy, as well as contributions from philosophers and scholars working out of the history of philosophy. It thus brings together cutting-edge contemporary discussion of issues related to skepticism and serious historical scholarship on this subject.

Online Submission

SKEP uses online submission only. Authors should submit their manuscript online via the Editorial Manager (EM) online submission system at: editorialmanager.com/skep. First-time users of EM need to register first. Go to the website and click on the "Register Now" link in the login menu. Enter the information requested.

When you register, select e-mail as your preferred method of contact. Upon successful registration, you will receive an e-mail message containing your Username and Password. If you should forget your Username and Password, click on the "Send Username/Password" link in the login section, and enter your first name, last name and email address exactly as you had entered it when you registered. Your access codes will then be e-mailed to you.

Prior to submission, authors are encouraged to read the 'Instructions for Authors'. When submitting via the website, you will be guided stepwise through the creation and uploading of the various files.



Instructions for Authors

A revised document is uploaded the same way as the initial submission. The system automatically generates an electronic (PDF) proof, which is then used for reviewing purposes. All correspondence, including the editor's request for revision and final decision, is sent by e-mail.

Peer Review Process

The journal is administered by the editors who handle the daily operation and management and the oversight of reviewing. Submissions are first screened by the editors, who evaluate their pertinence and quality. They are then sent to one or two referees who are selected among the members of the Editorial Board or among other recognized specialists. The peer review process is double-blind. On the basis of the evaluation of the referee(s), the editors make a final decision. Submissions by members of the Editorial Board are accepted only on the recommendation of outside referees. In the case of special issues, articles are usually by invitation but will also be peer reviewed. The referees are chosen in accordance with the following criteria: (i) they have a record of publication in the area or on the topic of the article or discussion note; (ii) they are not the primary 'target' of the paper; (iii) they are not known by the editors to be antecedently hostile to the topic or approach of the paper; and (iv) they are not a colleague of the author of the paper. The referees are required to ensure that their reports are clear, to provide sufficient rationale for their decisions, and to offer constructive comments that can be assimilated by the author.

Double-blinded Peer Review

SKEP uses a double-blind peer review system, which means that manuscript author(s) do not know who the reviewers are, and that reviewers do not know the names of the author(s). When you submit your article via Editorial Manager, you will be asked to submit a separate title page which includes the full title of the manuscript plus the names and complete contact details of all authors. This page will not be accessible to the referees. All other files (manuscript, figures, tables, etc.) should not contain any information concerning author names, institutions, etc. The names of these files and the document properties should also be anonymized.

File Format

Manuscripts should be submitted online in .doc or .rtf format.

Unicode and Non-Roman Scripts

In the case of manuscripts containing Greek or logical formulae, they should also be submitted in .pdf format. In the case of Greek characters, manuscripts may be submitted in .doc or .rtf format provided the font used is Unicode compliant. A Unicode compliant font is the Brill, which is free for author use: see brill.com/about/brill-fonts. Also see the following two documents:

Submission Requirements

Types of Submission

Articles and discussion notes on any subject related to the history and philosophical significance of skepticism are welcome for review. They must not have been published previously, in part or in their entirety, or be under consideration for publication elsewhere. They must be prepared for blind review. This means that the name and affiliation of the author should not be included in the manuscript, that any acknowledgments and bibliographic references to the author's own work should be avoided, and that document meta-data identifying the author should be removed.

Language

The journal publishes mainly in English, but submissions in French, German, Italian, Portuguese, or Spanish are also welcome. Spelling in the language used should be consistent throughout. The author is responsible for the correct use of the language chosen. Non-native speakers are strongly encouraged to have their contribution corrected by a native speaker.

Length

As a general rule, articles should not exceed 10,000 words, discussion notes should not exceed 6,000 words, critical notices should not exceed 4,000 words, and book reviews should not exceed 2,000 words. Critical notices and book reviews are by invitation only.

Manuscript Structure

All manuscripts should be double-spaced, including all quotations and notes. Submissions can be in any acceptable stylistic convention, but authors finalizing their papers for publication should observe the following stylistic rules. The name of the author should appear immediately after the title, together with his/her affiliation and his/her e-mail addresses.

Abstract and Keywords

Articles and discussion notes should be accompanied by an abstract in English of approximately 150 words and a list of 4-6 English keywords (in lowercase letters), to be placed below the abstract, for indexing purposes.

Headings

1 Introduction

The text

Footnotes

Footnotes should be numbered consecutively and placed at the bottom of each page. Superscript numbers marking footnotes should follow immediately after the punctuation or the quotation mark.

Italics

Authors should use *italics*, not underlining, for emphasizing words or phrases and for words in foreign languages.

Punctuation

Please place periods and commas inside the quotation marks.

Use double quotation marks for phrases and sentences, except in the case of quotes within quotes, and single quotation marks for so-called function words or words with a special status.

References

Internal references to page numbers in the contribution are not allowed.

Authors should follow the author-and-date style of reference and should include a list of references at the end of their papers. When listing multiple publications by a single author published in one year, the year of publication should be supplemented with lowercase letters to indicate the difference, e.g., 1998a, 1998b, etc. References in the text and in footnotes should be by name and publication date, followed by a comma and the page number, e.g., Stough (1984), 138.

Book and journal titles should be in italics, while titles of articles should be between double quotation marks. Authors' names should be in roman, not in capitals. The form of references may be illustrated as follows, and add a DOI where possible:

Monographs

Edited Volumes
